




■ The Self

- Kant thought the argument for the existence of self as a subject (or substance) failed on what is termed a "fallacy of four terms"
 - He thought the rationalist's argument used different senses for the term "self" in their argument for the existence of self—so the argument had 4 terms instead of 3 terms
 - In one premise they are speaking of "self" as an empirical self and in the other as a transcendental self
